

# King's Corner

For his fourth birthday my dad, Robert Mark King, received a gift that would change his life. The latest technology for playing pre-recorded music had just been released. These days that might be a new type of music streaming device, or greatly improved earbuds or headphones. That year – 1930 – RCA Victor produced the first vinyl record, 12" in diameter playing at 33 1/3 revolutions per minute (RPM), and a record player. His mother was single, divorced, so a major expense like this for her "Bobbie" was a sacrifice.

It came with an album by a 'cowboy' singer, filled with songs about the old west. They played it so many times that he could still sing some of the songs when well into his 90s. These were utterly out-of-place to a child in the rough urban neighborhoods of New Jersey, but that was their appeal. There was a better life "out west" where horses, rodeos, gun-shooting challenges and occasional romances happened in wild, wide open spaces.

The bible – in Proverbs – says, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and even when he is old he will not depart from it." Bobbie's mom gave him a dream as they sang to the songs on the record over and over again. She was giving him a gift of a new technology they could both enjoy. He was receiving the vision of a life he could only imagine, but became eager to embrace.

And the 'wild' part of the 'wild west' inspired him to get up to a few antics. Just the next year he was enrolled in a strict, tradition Catholic School run by young Father Stone and a group of inflexible nuns. He soon discovered he could slide down the tile roof, play with the delivery man's horse, and interrupt his teacher's stern lecture to him in the classroom by having his pet snake pop its head out of his desk's inkwell hole right by her hand.

His mom was determined he would be a "good Catholic boy" as well as an altar boy. What she didn't realize was that she'd already taught him a deeper lesson, imprinted a deeper longing that no amount of discipline was going to take away from him.

Each of us have our childhood dreams even if – as an adult – we've tucked them away in a corner we can barely remember. We each have childhood moments and places we fell in love with, that bring us special delight when we revisit those memories.

When we find friends – and later, lovers – who share our dreams and joys, then we feel like "someone gets me" at a deep level. These relationships bring us joy. They show us that someone cares that we are here, and that they share our passion. These give us the sense that we are understood, that we are "seen".

## Childhood Dreams

What if there's an even deeper imprint in you? We've discovered that babies often know their mother's voice from before they're born, and often father's voice if he also was talking to 'mommy's tummy'. And not just parents. As the prophet Isaiah said, "The Lord called me before my birth; from within the womb he called me by name". What if God imbued you with gifts, talents and a deep passion from the youngest age?

We want to be seen and heard and understood and recognized by God. To feel his unconditional love. And to be shown who we really are and what we're capable of being. To be truly "known" in the deepest way. And then to be inspired to put all of that into action, to chase that dream.

Sometimes you get shaken into taking that action.

At ten years old "Bobbie" was still in New Jersey. He was a big kid, and had no trouble winning fights, but this was far from his dream life. He and several friends rode their bicycles down to the field with a mooring mast where a hydrogen-filled airship carrying 97 people was coming in. They couldn't ride out onto the field, so they stood by the booth where Herbert Morrison was announcing the evening's events by radio.

As the Hindenburg went to dock, it tossed ropes from the bow to the ground crew working

to secure it. Static electricity ran skyward up the ropes and almost 300 feet above, fire broke out. An explosion at the rear of the airship broke its back; the tail crashed into the ground while fire engulfed the bow, all in thirty seconds.

Bobbie stood near Morrison as he narrated, "There's smoke, and there's flames, now, and the frame is crashing to the ground, not quite to the mooring mast. Oh, the humanity, and all the passengers screaming around here!" Thirty five passengers died in the flames.

Bobbie and his mom cried together that night. He desperately wanted to leave. She knew someone who could take them to a family farm in Wisconsin, and by the morning they'd organized it. They would finally move west, and begin a whole new life that just might fulfil his childhood dream.

What are your dreams? And what deep longings has God put in your heart? And are you still chasing them? Can you trust him for guidance, and wait for his sometimes unexpected timing?

Glenn and Molly excel at taking audience requests, once performing an unpracticed song with Molly finding lyrics online while Glenn playfully "consulted" the artist via his phone. The crowd loved it, unaware it was their first time. These musicians believe they're nothing without their audience.

"Lady an The Tramps" is a dynamic dance band playing country, blues, rock, disco, and oldies, available for private events. 

The historic Odeon Saloon has new owners and management dedicated to revitalizing the venue and preserving its history. Chris Pattison, along with his managers Jenn Bentley and Spencer Davidson, is excited to continue the legacy of the Odeon Saloon located on Pike Street in downtown historic Dayton, NV.

Permits for liquor and food have already been submitted and are currently awaiting approval. Chris plans to reopen

the kitchen to offer "basket" meals, along with Saturday and Sunday brunch. The number of pool tables will be reduced to two, with one located downstairs in the bar area and the other upstairs. Chris hopes to bring live events and historic talks to the building soon for the community to enjoy, along with occasional entertainment.

Plans are in place to add lawns to the side and back areas of the building, creating outdoor seating and encouraging visitors to enjoy games such as Jenga

and cornhole. A gold panning station may be included soon, as Dayton is the site of Nevada's first gold discovery.

They are collaborating with a local historian to ensure that all upgrades and painting are done accurately. There are hopes of getting the elevator operational again to provide accessibility to the upstairs venue.

Community members are invited to share local history photos of family, events, structures, or anything that

represents Dayton's history. A designated wall will showcase these photos; please keep them at size 8X10 or smaller.

It may take some time to establish a smooth flow while implementing these changes and additions. Everyone looks forward to creating a fun, historic space for guests to enjoy with family and friends. In the meantime, the venue is available for private parties and events with kitchen and bar area available for use.

# Lyon County Fire Chief Harvey to Retire

After nearly 9 years as Fire Chief for the Central Lyon County Fire Protection District and 37 years in the Nevada Fire Service, Rich Harvey is retiring. "It's been a great ride; I worked

with incredible people, ran many calls—some large, some small, but all significant to those involved. I climbed mountains, slogged through valleys, and I'll miss it, but it's time.

Rich never planned to be a firefighter. A Bay Area native, he left for Feather River College in Quincy, CA, intending to work at a gas station during summer break. Instead, friends convinced him to take a seasonal firefighting job with the US Forest Service. His first fire, the Spring Fire of 1979, hooked him. Mesmerized by the flames, he hesitated during a fallback until his Engine Boss pulled him to safety. "I knew then I liked big flames," he recalls. "They're an incredible adrenaline rush."

That summer sparked a passion for forestry, leading to a degree from Feather River College and a Bachelor of Science in Forest Management from Humboldt State University in 1987. Rich then joined the Nevada Division of Forestry in Winnemucca, running an inmate crew and earning EMT and structure firefighter certifications. Over 26 years with NDF, he rose

through the ranks, serving as Fire Chief in Elko County and supervising the statewide Fire and Aviation program before retiring in 2015 as Deputy State Forester. Retirement lasted four months before he joined Central Lyon Fire, initially part-time with Storey County Fire.

"I'm grateful for the people of Lyon County and the men and women of Central Lyon Fire," Rich said. "We've opened new fire stations, reduced response times, saved lives and properties, and served our communities. Being Fire Chief is about public safety and service, and it's been a pleasure."

When asked how he knew it was time to retire, Rich shared a story of seeing a boat named "Next Chapter" pass him on Hwy 50. He took it as a sign, ready to leave things in God's hands. Thank you, Chief Harvey, for your dedication and service.

The duo is blending professional expertise with small-town heart to ensure


Nevada families are protected when it matters most. And when life takes an unexpected turn, clients can rely on Schembri and her husband to guide them through the storm.


